- Black students in 2016 scored 181 points less on the SAT than white students.
- Black students have the highest likelihood of attending a D or F school when compared to other ethnicities
- When looking at IREAD data, black students fall the farthest behind with an average gap of 11
 percentage points below the state average passing rate and 14 percentage points below white
 students' passing rate.
- When looking at ISTEP data, for every one black student who is proficient in math and ELA, there are three who are not.

This report said 75% of black students are not proficient in math and English/language arts. This is alarming. This should make us fight and demand change. This is worth making a sacrifice. This is worth shutting down the government until we find a solution.

With our nation's leader, I feel like I am trapped inside the Twilight Zone or some bad reality television show that will not end. We cannot keep being distracted by the antics and theatrics of the president. We have to keep our focus on the real issues in our community even if the leader of our country will not.
